



Essential Question

- Section 1: Foreign Affairs and Diplomacy
 - How is foreign policy made and conducted?
 - Foreign policy is made by the President with the advice of members of the State Department and is carried out by U.S. ambassadors and other diplomats, both individually and as members of international organizations.

- Section 2: National Security
 - How does the Federal Government safeguard this nation's security?
 - The President and the Department of Defense oversee the operation of the nation's armed forces, the Director of National Intelligence oversees the operation of the nation's intelligence agencies, and the Department of Homeland Security coordinates all national efforts to combat terrorism.

- Section 3: American Foreign Policy Overview
 - How has American foreign policy changed over time?
 - The United States began as an isolationist country, concentrating its early foreign policy efforts in the Western hemisphere. It then became a major player in international affairs, influencing political, economic and military issues around the world.
